

Turn Taking



In Coniston we are always working on our play, sharing and turn taking skills . The role of the adult is to demonstrate how to interact with peers appropriately and model language such as 'my turn' , 'your turn' and 'waiting'. Encourage eye contact and interactions when necessary. Here are 7 activities that you can try at home.



Connect four

If you don't have connect four, cut a hole out the top of a cardboard box and take turns posting objects in the top.



Blowing bubbles

You can either take turns blowing them or take turns popping them.



Rolling a ball

Sit on the floor and roll a ball back and forth to a partner. The child may need an adult sitting behind them to help push.



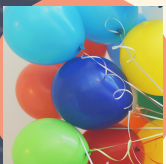
Playing tig

Take turns chasing and catching each other and shouting 'Tig!'.



Building a lego tower

Take turns adding one brick to the tower. How high can you build it? Can you count how many bricks there are?



Blowing up and letting go of a balloon.

You can take turns blowing it up, letting go of it and chasing it. Make sure to count '1,2,3... go before letting go!



Rolling toy cars or balls down a ramp

Make-shift a ramp using a piece of wood, a large book or anything else you can come up with.
